NEWS FROM THE HEAD OF SCHOOL

Year 4 had a lovely day out on Monday - our young scientists spent the day at Slimbridge. A trip planned to support the children's topics of 'Habitats', activities included pond dipping, a bird talk, bird watching and an exploration of Toad Hall. On Tuesday, Mr Morphew treated our Year 3s to a similarly excellent day out. Part of the Wiltshire Wildlife Trust, Lower Moor Farm proved another brilliant location for hands-on learning, reinforcing the children's study of 'Helping Plants Grow', and also providing the opportunity to investigate mini beasts. The day involved bug hunts, pond dipping, tree tapping and outdoor games based on plants. Then, on Wednesday, Year 2 visited Cotswold Wildlife Park, also to support their science learning about habitats and adaptations, and today our Kindergarten children are enjoying a day at Cotswold Farm Park - what a fun and educational week!

This week, pupils from Reception to Year 6 have taken part in a special Food Waste Week. The idea came from our social action group, 'Changemakers', and my assemblies were duly devoted to this all-important issue. Having explained the problems associated with wasting food, I asked the children for ideas as to how we can all cut down on wastage; there were some thoughtful ideas. My assemblies concluded with a quote by Tristram Stuart, author of 'The Global Food Waste Scandal':"We are trashing our land to grow food that no one eats." The children then took part in a week-long, lunchtime house competition to determine which house could produce the least food waste. (Pre-Prep and Early Years children were allocated a temporary house). Each house was given a bin - with the four lids in house colours - and after lunch each day, the kitchen staff weighed the contents. The

winning house will be announced in assembly on Monday, and will be awarded the Food Waste Cup. Let's hope lessons have been learnt, that we can keep up the good work to produce less food waste.

NEWS FROM KINDERGARTEN

This week we have been reading the story 'The Snail and the Whale' by Julia Donaldson. The children have loved learning about the snail's adventures, the places he visited, the friends he made along the way; we also gave lots of thought to how kind the snail was to save his friend the whale at the end. During Circle Time, the children gave us their ideas of when they are kind, brave and helpful too.

The book led our learning to hunt for snails - and other mini beasts - during our Forest School sessions, we found 10 snails altogether, collected them in a tuff tray, observed a 'silvery trail' and 'itchy foot' before returning them to their natural habitats.

Inside this week the children made some cupcakes, and we linked this activity to our maths learning of I more and I less up to a total of 5. We counted 5 buns to understand adding I more, then sang 'One Currant Bun in a Baker's Shop' to understand the concept of taking I away each time. At the art workshop the children the children independently chose from a variety of materials to create some amazing
