NEWS FROM THE HEAD OF SCHOOL

Dear Parents

The week kicked off in style with everyone (including me) wearing odd socks or jazzy tights! This marked the beginning of Anti-Bullying Week 2023, and reminded us of how important it is to accept uniqueness and differences. The theme for this year's is Make a Noise About Bullying, and across the week there were assemblies, discussions and activities exploring the importance of consideration and kindness - and how to speak out and stop bullying in our everyday lives. I stressed this important message in my assembly on Monday, and delved further into the subject in my CWB lessons. Anti-Bullying Week is such an important event, and a great way to remind the children about how they must speak to trusted adults if they are unhappy. Needless to say, the children's happiness and wellbeing is at the heart of everything we do here at Berkhampstead. We work tirelessly to ensure that the pastoral care we provide is tip-top. We are proud that we continue to hold the Gloucestershire Healthy Living and Learning Award, and have done so since 2017.

Diwali was celebrated by Year I children on Monday. The children were thrilled to walk into Mrs Stephenson's classroom to find it adorned with pretty T-lights and jewel-coloured costumes. Mrs Amlani showed the children how to cook authentic Bombay aloo and chapati, and they tried on traditional costume, and designed henna and rangoli patterns (more from Mrs Stephenson later in the newsletter). Kindergarten also had the opportunity to dress up this week; they were celebrating World Nursery Rhyme Week, so came to school on Wednesday dressed as their favourite character. Our youngest children also celebrated Diwali by drawing rangoli patterns on the entrances to Kindergarten.

It's also been an exciting week for Years 4 and 5, who have been on school trips this week. An excited Year 4 headed off across the border to Chepstow Castle, to enhance their learning of the Middle Ages. Mr McCreanor tells me how much the children enjoyed the tour of the castle, learning about its defences, dressing up and finding out about the weapons that were used in Medieval times. Meanwhile, the Year 5s travelled slightly further afield to the more exotic claims of the Living Rainforestbut in Berkshire. The Year 5 geographers are now experts on tropical climates and the animals and plants that live there.

It was good to see so many of you at our SchoolsMobile information sessions yesterday. SchoolsMobile is a digital safeguarding platform, and their app is being installed on all 1:1 iPads (Years 4 - 6) that are managed in school but go home with the children. We are purchasing a licence for each child in Years 4 - 6, and parents of these pupils will then be able to use SchoolsMobile on non-school devices - free of charge - if they wish. 

Oscar: 'It is the festival of light.'


Esme: 'People have a big meal with their families.'


Peter: 'They send cards to each other.'
