## NEWS FROM THE HEAD OF SCHOOL

#### Dear Parents,

This week, during my assemblies, I have been focussing on the importance of kindness, and illustrated my message with key words written on cards, associated with being kind. On the reverse of the cards were opposing words. I also showed the children a cartoon about Joy the dog and a heron. At first Joy was angry at Heron for snatching worms, but when Joy saw that Heron wasn't taking the worms for herself, but rather to feed her hungry babies, her attitude changed from anger to compassion. I asked the children to reflect on this, stressing how the ability to empathise with others is so important. Kindness is a value that is celebrated at Berkhampstead from Kindergarten - and from Year I, each half term, a child in Prep and one in Pre-Prep are awarded with Kindness Cups.

Thursday was a particularly busy day. The Prep and Pre-Prep eco committees were delighted to welcome Hannah Leatherland, from Cheltenham Borough Council to assembly. Her aim was to raise awareness about air pollution and the ways in which we can help reduce it here in Cheltenham. Hannah was armed with plenty of interesting and eye-opening facts and figures. For instance, leaving a car idle (the engine running in a traffic jam) for just five minutes produces an alarming 23 shipping containers' worth of emissions - and we breathe a staggering 11,000 litres of air per day, so clean air really is vital. Her advice for drivers of idle cars is to turn the engine off when the car is stationary. She also encouraged 'active' modes of transport to school such as walking, cycling or scooting, or using public transport. Lift sharing was also a suggestion. Hannah then attended a joint Pre-Prep and Prep eco meeting, and shared even more ideas about how we as a school community can raise awareness of the harmful effects of air pollution and how we can reduce them here at Berkhampstead.

NEWS FROM KINDERGARTEN

This week in Kindergarten, we have been celebrating National Storytelling Week. Everyone has brought in their favourite story which has provided some wonderful, eclectic books for us to read throughout the week.

The children had some definite ideas of why they liked their story.

Holly: 'Kitty McClaw runs away, they come and get her. This is my favourite page because the long tunnel goes round and round.'

Eddie: 'The peas were too hot, and the bath was too cold.'

Posey: 'It's find-you-mum book, he can't find his mum and a butterfly helps him.'

Reggie: 'The tiger came, he drank all the water in the tap, he ate all the food in the fridge.'

During Circle Time, I gave the children a list of clues. They needed to guess which traditional story I was describing. They listened and thought about each clue carefully before giving their answer. The children could guess the answer, can you?

Our storytelling has led the children to act out scenes from their favourite book and create story scenes in the tuff trays with bricks, twigs, and straw and three pigs.
