BERKY GETS GREENER

This term, the Eco Committee has continued with their focus on air quality, working alongside Hannah Leatherland from Cheltenham Borough Council's 'Care for Our Air' campaign.

World Health Organisation figures show that 91% of the world's children breathe toxic air every day and that 29% of all lung cancer deaths are attributed to air pollution.

The children recognise that to improve the quality of the air around the school grounds, it would be useful to know what the current levels are. Hannah has helped us with this by loaning us 'Monty', the air quality monitor that has been installed on the lamppost outside the main school gates. He is constantly recording the levels of nitrogen dioxide and fine particulate matter in the air. Monty will stay in place into the school summer holidays so that we will be able to compare data in and out of term time. IH








